

the use of different techniques and with the various fascinating things that move me", he emphasizes.

To Bernardo Mosqueira, the curator, it is politically important to appreciate artists from outside the country's economic-cultural mainstream: "Brazil is too big, there are many ways to live and exist in it, which we ignore. We have a diversity of knowledge, and I think works like those of Luiz are tremendously important to shape the Brazilian people's thoughts about Brazil. It's another important step for the creation of a Brazilian cultural autonomy, to acknowledge each other, to acknowledge a different kind of Brazilian and understand that there's knowledge in that. It's another reason it's important to have a show like this one."

With more than 200 shows carried out, between solos and groups, **Luiz** has received diverse awards for his work, such as APCA prize of best photography show of 2014 - for *Retumbante natureza humanizada (Resounding Humanized Nature)* -, and the Marc Ferrez prize, from the Instituto Nacional de Fotografia (National Institute of Photography) - Funarte, in 1988. In 1991, he received, for *Anos de Luz (Years of Light)*, the Leopold Godowsky Color Photography Awards, from Boston University, exhibited in MASP the following year. One of the two Brazilian representatives in 53^a Venice Biennial, in 2009, the artist had his works already shown in countries such as Germany, Argentina, Belgium, Canada, Slovenia, U.S.A., France, Netherlands, England, Italy, Japan, Mexico, Norway, Portugal and Switzerland. His works compose collections of important institutions such as the Pérez Art Museum Miami, Photographic Resource Center, in Boston University (U.S.A.), Centre Culturel Les Chiroux (Belgium), Centro Português de Fotografia, in Porto, Novo Banco Collection, Lisboa (Portugal), MAM/SP, Pinacoteca do Estado de São Paulo, MASP, MAM/RJ, Biblioteca Nacional and the Museu de Arte do Rio, among others.
